

***MINUTES OF THE 184th STATED
MEETING OF THE PRESBYTERY OF EAST IOWA***

WORSHIP

At 10:00 a.m., the PEIA body joined together for worship. Scripture for this service was drawn from Mark 9: 38-50 for the message, "What's This World Coming To?", offered by the Reverend Dottie Halverson. The Reverend Kristin Hutson and CRE Don Clark assisted with worship. Musical offerings were provided by Damon Cole, Ann Buckheister, and the Westminster Chancel Choir and Men's Ensemble. The offering of \$412 was dedicated to fund the Light Group in the Presbytery of Remera, Rwanda.

The 184th Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of East Iowa was called to order with prayer at 11:00 a.m. by Moderator Karen Minnis. The Moderator welcomed all those present and expressed appreciation to Westminster Presbyterian Church for hosting the meeting and to the staff and officers of the Presbytery for their work in preparing for the meeting.

DOCKET

Moderator Minnis recognized the Stated Clerk, who advised the body that a motion to approve the docket was in order. She noted that such a motion would include the table docket distributed at registration. **A motion to approve the docket, including the table docket, was seconded and APPROVED.**

The body welcomed the Reverend Karen Woo, minister member of Central Nebraska Presbytery, who will be presented to fill a Temporary Pastoral Relationship with the Washington, UP church. **A motion to seat the Reverend Karen Woo as a corresponding member was seconded and APPROVED.**

INTRODUCTION OF FIRST-TIME PRESBYTERS

Moderator Minnis welcomed Carl Frank, first-time commissioner from Mt. Pleasant, First.

WELCOME FROM THE HOST PASTOR

Moderator Minnis introduced the Reverend Kristin Hutson, host pastor, who welcomed those present, affirming that the church is particularly joyful to house the offices for the Presbytery Stated Clerk, Finance Manager, and Communications Project Manager. She provided information about locations in the church building for activities during the meeting, rest room facilities, and the arrangements for the meal.

REPORT OF THE STATED CLERK

Stated Clerk Blair presented the following action item:

MOTION: The Stated Clerk advises that a motion would be in order that the Presbytery approve the minutes of the 183rd Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of East Iowa, convened on 12 August 2018 at Vinton Presbyterian Church in Vinton, Iowa. These minutes may be found on the Presbytery website—www.peia.org—under the "Meetings and Minutes" tab.

The motion was seconded and APPROVED.

INFORMATION ITEMS

- The Presbytery lifts up prayers for
 - The Reverend Emory and Phyllis VanGerpen. Phyllis suffered a fall in her mobility scooter, breaking her collarbone and receiving contusions and cuts.

- The Reverend Jessica Crane Muñoz and family as they work through the process of treatment at UIHC Children’s Hospital for their newborn son, Jesse. Jesse was born with Severe Combined Immune Disorder, a genetic condition that will require a bone marrow transplant within the next four weeks. Over the past two weeks, he has received treatment at UIHC for a dangerous strain of pneumonia. Jesse must remain in a pressure-positive room to prevent further infection of any sort since his immune system is nearly non-existent.
- The Presbytery thanks Westminster PC for all of the gracious hospitality shared as we moved into our offices. This move is part of an ongoing process to move to a virtual presbytery. This office space is not the conventional office that we have been accustomed to. There is no receptionist or administrative assistant, and the Stated Clerk and staff members will not necessarily be here daily, but instead will be here to use files, collect mail, and use the copier. The Presbytery information center is no longer lodged in a physical office space, but can now be found in the virtual office space on the Presbytery website.
- Please reflect upon how you can use your gifts, skills, and talents in service to the Presbytery and fill out the Team Interest Sheets to let us know about your interests and passions for service.
- Congratulations to St. Andrew Presbyterian Church as they receive a denominational seed grant in the amount of \$7,500 from the 1001 New Worshipping Community program administered by the Mission Development Resources Committee. This grant will fund the establishment of a collaborative ministry (JustChurch) with pastors from Gloria Dei Lutheran Church (ELCA) to serve those persons in the CR-IC Corridor who feel ostracized from the Church yet who hunger to be active in a faith community.
- The Presbytery has endorsed a grant application for \$250,000 to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance on behalf of Iowa WINs in Mt. Pleasant to provide seed money for hospitality house ministry.

MOTION: The Trustees recommend that the Presbytery approve the request from the Session of Rowley, First to sell the manse.

Background Information

This building has sat empty for over three years. There is a party interested in purchasing the building, and the realtor has estimated the price/worth at \$70,000, but the session would sell the building "as is" for a lesser amount.

The motion was APPROVED.

MOTION: The Trustees recommend that, in accordance with the Church Property Projects Policy, the Presbytery approve the following request from the Session of Morning Sun, First United

Our session has voted to have a new a/c unit put in the sanctuary of our church. We will be paying for the job out of proceeds from the sale of our manse with the balance coming from memorial funds. Even though we are not borrowing money, the approved bid is greater than 10% of our annual budget.

LUNCH

At 11:48 a.m., Moderator Minnis declared the meeting in recess for lunch. She invited the Reverend Kristin Hutson to offer a prayer for the meal. The body adjourned to the Family Life Center for a delicious meal.

At 1:2:50 p.m., Moderator Minnis reconvened the meeting with prayer and invited Vice-Moderator Dan Jessop to assume the chair.

INTERNATIONAL PEACEMAKER

TE Lisa Ross Thedens, co-moderator of the Peacemaker Task Force introduced the Reverend Jerome Bizimana, President of Remera Presbytery in the Presbyterian Church of Rwanda and founder of The Light Group, a group that uses pastoral counseling, conversation, storytelling, sharing of feelings and listening to bring about reconciliation between Tutsi and Hutu peoples in response to the civil war in Rwanda.

Reverend Bizimana explained that he was born in Congo and has been a pastor for 20 years. He came to Rwanda in 1994. The Presbyterian Church has been present in Rwanda since 1900. It was the first Protestant church, building churches, schools, and hospitals as outreach ministries. Currently, he is serving in a parish that started in 1912. His ministry focuses on orphans, widows,

and those injured in the genocide activities. His calling is to spiritually nurture these people as a means to help them reconcile. While he finds his ministry of reconciliation after the genocide to be deeply worthwhile, he also wants people to understand that Rwanda is more than just the genocide. He presented further information about Rwanda's four provinces and revealed information about why Rwanda is known as the Country of 1000 Hills.

Officials in Rwanda recently shared "official" numbers: 1,074,017 Tutsi and moderate Hutu were brutally killed in the one hundred days of genocide in 1994, leaving behind hundreds of thousands of orphans, widows, widowers, and people with disabilities. It's nearly unthinkable that such an atrocity could happen in modern times. And, it's hard to imagine how Rwandans could ever heal from the ordeal.

But a group of Rwandan Presbyterians are working to bring healing and reconciliation to those involved. Through an initiative called the Light Group, God is helping heal situations that you would normally think are unhealable. Here are two of their stories:

"...And now we are friends, and we have given our children in marriage to one another." These words concluded the story of a Tutsi genocide survivor in Remera, Rwanda, a woman who saw her husband and four children killed and her home burned. Nine months after the atrocity, she gave birth. She described thirteen years of loneliness, grief and poverty as a single mother. Then, in 2007, the government released a large number of prisoners, nearly all men who had been perpetrators of the genocide. Most of them returned to their communities. This woman told of the utter panic she had felt when she saw the man who had killed her family walking back into town, a free man. She nearly fainted, but managed to run to her house where she hid for a few weeks.

She went on to tell of how the man came time and time again to her home to see her and ask for her forgiveness, even through the locked door. She would not see him or talk to him; she could not bring herself to do so. But each time he came, he would do some work for her – tilling her small farm plot, repairing a door, patching her roof.

After a long time of this, she went to talk to her Presbyterian pastor, Jerome Bizimana. After discussions with Reverend Bizimana, she eventually met with the man and joined the Light Group that Pastor Jerome had formed in the church. Through a few years of pastoral counseling, conversation, storytelling, sharing of feelings and listening, she recently said that God helped her to forgive the man that had killed her loved ones – "little bit by little bit and slowly by slowly."

A perpetrator began his story by pointing to a woman in the group and saying, "I participated in the killings – I killed her husband and family." Christian workers came into the prison where he was detained and told the men that God loved them and had given the life of his son, Jesus, that they might find new life in that love. This man had become ashamed of the killings and also that he could not provide for his family because he was in jail for what he had done. It took him a long time to believe that God could possibly forgive that much, but he began to participate in

the prison fellowship and grew in his faith. Before their release, the prisoners were taught how to confess their sins and how to approach those they had wronged and to seek their forgiveness by serving and loving them as they would their own families. He burned with shame when he returned to the community and people he met on the road would turn their faces or run away. But he joined the Light Group and they encouraged each other to persevere. He held to the truth he had come to believe: "The love of God does not have any limits. There is nothing that God cannot forgive. It is hard to wait for others to forgive. It is hard work. But God has brought us back to life and helped us."

These stories, and others like them, are possible because of the Light Group started by Pastor Jerome. The group has forty members, including twelve survivors (rape victims, widows, orphans and wounded) and twenty-eight former detainees who have confessed to committing these atrocities against them or others. Pastor Jerome, who received special training in reconciliation in Zambia, formed the group in 2010 to encourage deep levels of personal, spiritual and communal healing. Members continue to meet regularly to share life and pray, help each other with work, care for each other in need, and even invest together in cooperative efforts. Now the Light Group goes out into the community – to businesses, schools and universities, memorial events, and other churches to share their stories and their vision of reconciliation.

Reverend Bizimana concluded by affirming that Rwanda is indeed rising from the ashes. With God, all things are possible, including healing and reconciliation from the Rwanda Genocide against Tutsi. He asked for the prayers and support of everyone in the Presbytery.

REPORT OF THE COMMUNICATIONS PROJECT MANAGER

Julia Andrews, Communications Project Manager, noted that a central aspect of her job concerns facilitating improved communications across the Presbytery. Within the website, which is now the Presbytery's virtual office, users will find more visual information in a more accessible format. The website will be configured to work on all devices and will be easier to use. She requested that folks across the Presbytery contribute pictures of our mission and ministry in action. She also asked for feedback about how she can be the most effective resource to facilitate improved communications.

REPORT OF THE MINISTERS AND CONGREGATIONS COMMISSION

Commission moderator TE Jennifer Jennings presented the following report on behalf of the commission.

ACTION ITEMS

MOTION: The MCC recommends that the Presbytery approve the following terms of contract for the Reverend Karen Woo (minister member of Central Nebraska Presbytery) to serve in a Temporary Pastoral Relationship at United Presbyterian Church in Washington, IA, and that while serving in this relationship the Reverend Ms. Woo be admitted to dual membership in the Presbytery of East Iowa

The contract can be terminated by giving 30 days written notice by either party with concurrence of the Presbytery of East Iowa.

Moderator Minnis invited the Reverend Karen Woo forward to introduce herself and to be examined for membership in the Presbytery. After extended questioning from the body, **a motion to cease the examination was seconded and APPROVED.** The Reverend Ms. Woo was escorted from the room. **A motion to sustain the examination, to enroll the Reverend Karen Woo in dual membership during her service within PEIA, and to affirm the recommendation of the MCC concerning terms of contract was seconded and APPROVED.**

Statement of Faith

By the Reverend Karen Lynn Woo

I believe in one, sovereign, triune God who is revealed to us through Holy Scripture as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

I believe God created the heavens and the earth, all things visible and invisible, and continues to hold all things together by His power in accordance with His will. God looked upon His creation and saw that it was very good. But when Adam and Eve ate the fruit of the tree that was in the middle of the garden, against God's instruction, their sin corrupted and broke our relationship with God, with one another, and with the whole of creation. This made it impossible for humankind to live with God, and condemned humankind to certain death through separation from God. For since the time that fruit was eaten, all humankind has been in bondage to sin. I believe we are saved by God's grace through faith in Jesus, the Son, who in the fullness of time was sent to earth by the Father to redeem humankind from their sin. He was conceived by the Holy Spirit in the womb of Mary, a virgin, making Him both fully God and fully human. By His death on a cross he became the only acceptable sacrifice to redeem the sin of all humankind for all time. In rising from the dead 3 days later, He opened the way for anyone who believes in Him to have eternal life. Afterward He ascended into heaven and now sits at the right hand of God the Father.

I believe the Holy Spirit is the spirit of God, who enables us to believe in our triune God, to have faith in the Truth of His Word, and reminds us of the teachings of Jesus. She reveals to us how God's Word applies to every generation, to draw us closer to God, as she guides our footsteps. It is the power of God's Spirit that frees us from eternal death in a grave, and opens up eternal life for us in heaven. Like the wind, we cannot see God's spirit; but we can see her handiwork as

God speaks to us and through us, enlightening us as we read His Word, empowering us with her spiritual gifts, and working miracles in and around God's people.

I believe the Bible is God's authoritative Word. Within its pages, God reveals to us who He is, how we are to relate to Him, and how we, God's people, are to relate to one another. Through the Bible we learn that long ago God made a covenant with His people, saying that if we would walk in His ways, He would be our God and we would be His people. All scripture is inspired by God, making the Bible our instruction manual for life. Within its covers are God's words for teaching, admonition, correction, and training the disciples of the church.

I believe the Church, the Body of Christ, is made up of believers in every time and place. I believe becoming a believer is the beginning, not the end, of one's spiritual journey. I believe the Church exists to share its knowledge of Jesus and the good news of His Gospel with the rest of the world; that we are commanded by Christ to share His light, love, and saving grace with the people of the earth; and that we are to make disciples who will do the same. We do this via the proclamation of the Gospel in word and in deed, as we invite the community to worship with us, provide opportunities for baptism, Bible study and Christian fellowship, pray for those around us and beyond the borders of our city, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger, care for the sick, visit those in prison, and demonstrate God's love to all who will accept it.

I believe Baptism and the Lord's Supper are the sacraments of the church. I believe Baptism marks the beginning of a new life in Christ. It is the sign and seal of our incorporation into Him. Baptism connects us to Christ and to every member of His church. "It is a sign of God's gracious covenant with the Church . . . a covenant of grace in which God washes us clean and makes us holy and whole."

I believe "The Lord's Supper is the sign and seal of our communion with the crucified and risen Lord," a foretaste of the great banquet God will host at the end of time. I believe we celebrate the Lord's Supper in remembrance of the great work that was done on the cross as Christ gave His body . . . poured out His blood . . . to redeem the lives of believers in every time and place. I believe Christ's death was not the end but a new beginning for God's covenant people, the saga of which will continue until Christ, Himself, comes again at the end of time to judge the living and the dead. Those judged righteous will enter into eternal life with God and the others to eternal death through separation from God.

MOTION: The MCC recommends that the Presbytery approve the following Temporary Pastoral Relationship between the Reverend Penny Thomsen and the Lost Nation, Union church:
